# WARREN COHEN

# Conductor, Symphony Orchestra Artistic Director, NJIO



Warren Cohen has been the Artistic Director of the New Jersey Intergenerational Orchestra since 2013. He is also Music Director of the MusicaNova Orchestra in Phoenix, Arizona. In 2012 he became Concert Artist in Conducting at Kean University. He has previously served as Music Director of the Scottsdale Baroque Orchestra, the Fine Arts String Orchestra, and the Southern Arizona Orchestra, where he was appointed Music Director Laureate.

Mr. Cohen began his musical career as a pianist and composer, and his early positions included a stint as a ballet accompanist for the Honolulu City Ballet and as Music Director of the Kumu Kahua Theatre group in Hawaii. His work in Theatre and Opera led to his becoming a conductor. Over the past fifteen years he has conducted almost a thousand orchestral, operatic and choral works.

He studied conducting with, among others, Gustav Meier and Paul Vermel, and did a year of study at the English National Opera during the last year of the administration of the "power trio" years when the company was led by Sir Mark Elder, David Pountney and Sir Peter Jonas.

Mr. Cohen now lives in South Orange, New Jersey with his wife, soprano Carolyn Whitaker, and son Graham, an award winning composer and violist who studies at The Juilliard School. in New York.

# BRIAN McGOWAN, Conductor, Intermezzo Orchestra



Brian McGowan is a music educator, composer, and conductor based in New Jersey. He is currently the Conductor of the Intermezzo Orchestra at NJIO, and has been since September, 2016. He has been the Director of Orchestras for the William Annin Middle School in Basking Ridge since 2006. Under Brian's direction, the William Annin Orchestra program has doubled in size. The program now consists of five orchestras and has been featured in the New Jersey Music

Educators Association State Convention twice. Brian founded the full symphony orchestra program that remains one of the few middle schools in the state to have a full orchestra at the middle school level. He continues to program the classic repertoire, while also reaching for innovation in new music, conducting six composition world premieres, including student compositions, as well as premieres by professional composers such as Mark Fabio, NYU Faculty member Youngmi Ha, and a commissioned work by Kennedy Center Fellow Reena Esmail.

# **ELIZABETH MALISZEWSKI, Conductor, Prelude Ensemble**



Beth Maliszewski is a violist, violinist and music educator originally from Chatham. She has been the conductor of the NJIO Prelude Ensemble since 2019. She is currently the Orchestra Director at Herbert Hoover Middle School in Edison, where she coordinates an annual concert festival with 350 students. Beth graduated from Mason Gross School of the Arts, Rutgers University with a degree in Music Education, summa cum laude. She then received a Master's degree, with a concentration in Music Education, from Ithaca College. Beth has been a guest lecturer at the NJ Music Educators State Convention and Summer Conference. Born to two New Jersey music educators, Beth has been actively involved in music her entire life.

# Interested in playing in an Ensemble?

NJIO has four different ensembles from which to choose:

**Outreach** is an ensemble led by violist Miki Hatcher. This group rehearses once a month and plays familiar melodies in string quartet arrangements. (upper winds are welcome to join in!) Outreach performs about once a month in nursing homes, specialized schools, libraries etc. Rehearsals are one Wednesday a month from 7 - 9 pm.

**Prelude** is our beginner level group and is led by Elizabeth Maliszewski. This string ensemble is perfect for new string players, or people who are returning to music after a long break. Members of Prelude should have an understanding of basic notes and rhythms. Previous ensemble experience is not needed. This group meets on Mondays from 4:30 – 5:30 pm.

**Intermezzo** is our intermediate group, led by Brian McGowan. This group includes all orchestral instruments. Intermezzo plays short pieces and arrangements. Ensemble experience is not mandatory but helpful. We currently have openings in all instrument categories. Rehearsals are on Mondays from 5:45 - 7:00 pm.

**Symphony** is our advanced group and is conducted by our Artistic Director Warren Cohen. Ensemble experience is recommended. This group plays complete orchestral pieces and concertos. There are currently some spots open in strings, percussion, and brass. Symphony rehearses on Mondays from 7:15 – 9:30 pm.

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#### INTERMEZZO PROGRAM NOTES

# George Fredric Handel Water Music, Suite in F major HWV 348. II. Air and VI. Hornpipe

In 1685, George Fredric Handel was born in Halle, Saxony-Anhalt, now a state in Germany . Although being born in Germany and musically trained in Italy, he spent most of his successful career in London. Handel composed "Water Music" as three suites for orchestra for a boat party and outdoor concert. King James I on July 17, 1717 arranged this to entertain the guests on their ride from Whitehall to Chelsea in which an orchestra of nearly 50 musicians performed on a barge while King James and his guests rode separate barges. It was reported that King James I enjoyed the music so much he asked for it to be performed multiple times on that occasion.

We are performing the "Air" and "Hornpipe" from the Suite in F major arranged by Hamilton Harty. The "Air" is very serene and vocal like and the "Hornpipe" features a Baroque style hornpipe in three as opposed to a folk style hornpipe in two. Harty orchestrated it for modern orchestra instrumentation such as lower pitched brass instruments and the inclusion of clarinets which were not a part of the original scoring by Handel. For this reason, it remains one of the more popular versions performed.

# Edvard Grieg Norwegian Dances No 2 & 3

Edvard Grieg was born on June 15th, 1843 to a musical family in Norway. As was common with other Romantic era composers, Grieg relied heavily on the folk music of his homeland in his compositions. The folk song collection *Mountain Melodies Old and New* by Ludvig Lindman is a large inspiration for the *Norwegian Dances Suite*. Most of the melodies are considered "halling" dances, from the Hallingdal region in Norway. All four movements feature a fast-slow-fast structure, except the second movement which reverses it to slow-fast-slow. The folk influence is heavy in the music with off beat accents and light dance-like melodies. Grieg originally composed the suite as a duet for two pianos and it was later orchestrated by his friend Hans Sitt.

#### SYMPHONY PROGRAM NOTES

#### **Carwithen Suffolk Suite**

Doreen Carwithen (1922-2003) was a British composer. During her lifetime she was known primarily for her film music and as the wife of William Alwyn; who was himself an important composer. Curiously, in all of her writing about, and in promotion of, her husband's music she used the name Mary Alwyn and actually preferred that form of address in private. Mary was her middle name and she always hated the name Doreen. Nevertheless, she continued to compose under her given name.

Her music was colorful and accessible (and sounds nothing like her husband's!). The cinematic element is present even in her designated orchestral music. It shows some influence of Ralph Vaughan Williams, with whom she studied composition, but it is hard to pin her down as a British Pastoral composer because her music is considerably more muscular and assertive than the typical works in that genre. After her death, it was largely ignored until Chandos put out a recording that included this work and a wonderful Concerto for Piano and String Orchestra. Suffolk Suite was composed for a royal visit to open a new concert hall at Framlingham College in Suffolk and was written for the orchestra size and capacity of the students there. The music is based on themes that Carwithen composed for the film "East Anglian Holiday", a 20 minute film from the British Transport Society that was used as a promotion for the tourism in the region. Although the claim that the music was based on the material from the film came from the composer, I would challenge anyone watching the movie to catch the connection. Outside of some fleeting moments, the music in the film sounds nothing like the "Sussex Suite". One curiosity is that the upbeat march tune from the finale of the Suite has a cameo as a rather melancholy lyrical passage near the end of the film. Perhaps some of the music for the suite was derived from music that was rejected for the film?

## Coleridge-Taylor Petite Suite de Concert

Samuel Coleridge-Taylor (1875-1912) was a composer with an improbable life story, an improbable career, and an improbable posthumous run as a enormously successful composer. Born in Croydon, a suburb of London, his father was a doctor from Sierra Leone and his mother was a lower middle class English woman. His father returned to Sierra Leone before his son was born and may not have even known of his existence. He was brought up by his mother and his grandparents, although they gave him his father's last

Born in Barcelona (1964) Although Mr. Burgos attended the Badalona Conservatory when he was older and received private classes from some composers, he considers himself self taught

Mr. Burgos has worked as an accompanist pianist for many popular music artists. He also worked for theater, cabaret, TV and commercials. Additionally, he has composed choral, chamber, soloist and symphonic music, has won a dozen awards, and has premiered

works both in Europe and in both Americas.

Currently Mr. Burgos is secretary of the Association of Catalan Composers. His works can be found on various digital platforms

#### Manel Burgos de la Rosa, Fatum

Fate has led humanity to suffer another new pandemic that we have all endured as best we could. This work would not exist without the will to overcome ourselves and move on.

Forced by circumstances, Maestro Warren Cohen was looking for an unusual repertoire; works for symphony orchestra that do not include the string family. There are only a few examples - perhaps Stravinsky's Symphonies od Wind Instruments is one of the best known. So I contacted Warren telling him that I could try it. In 2020, forced by lockdown, I had written many works. Some of which had won in concert band composition contests in Spain.

The work has a parodic sense of the typical music that these bands interpret and that define what the collective imagination has about what sounds Spanish for so long. Since the cliché is itself a form of exaggeration, everything in this work is deliberately exaggerated, how could it be otherwise. The comic, the picaresque, the heroic, the false and finally the tragic, all coexist in the theater of the world.

His father's last name as his surname. His mother decided to call him Coleridge, as a play on the name of the famous poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge. The hyphenated form of his name came from a printer's error on his first published score-he liked what it looked like, and from then on adopted that form.

He took violin lessons as a child. His teacher noted his talent and recommended him to the Royal College of Music, where he was admitted on scholarship at the age of fifteen. He studied composition with Charles Stanford, who thought highly of him, and by the time of Coleridge-Taylor's graduation Edward Elgar said the he was "the best of the young composers we have." At the age of 23 he composed the work for which he is best known: the Oratorio "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast". The work was an immediate hit and, at the time of his premature death, it was the third most performed Oratorio in the English speaking world, only surpassed by performances of Handel's Messiah and Mendelssohn's Elijah. After his death it briefly fell out of fashion. It was then revived with extraordinary success from the 1920's through to the start of the Second World War. Every June, at the enormous Crystal Palace in West London, performances of Hiawatha played to sold out houses. These semi-staged productions were an opportunity for the audience to dress up as characters from the Oratorio and a procession of Hiawathas and Minnehanas watched the show. It was the most anticipated event of the summer season.

As Coleridge-Taylor tried to move on from Hiawatha, he became fascinated with his own African heritage (although there is no evidence that he ever tried to seek out his father) or his grandfather who had been a freed American slave and was repatriated to Africa. Coleridge-Taylor traveled to the United States twice, where he was received by President Roosevelt at the White House and became as famous there as he was in England. He began to use American and African materials in his music although they are played through the Victorian lens that was natural to him.

The Petite Suite is a late work, written just a year before his death. In this and several other late works, his music anticipates the style and orchestration of "British Light Music"-a genre that is usually described as somewhere between classical and popular music with a strong emphasis on melody rather than on form or harmonic development. The style was popular from the 1930's to the 1950's, and the American version of this style was captured in recordings of the likes of Mantovani and "101 Strings", and most enduringly, in the music of Leroy Anderson. Coleridge-Taylor's colorful orchestration, extraordinary skill as a melodist and pitch perfect sense of how long his materials should last is on perfect display in this charming Suite.
